How to Encourage your Child to Become a Critical Thinker

What is Critical Literacy?

"Literacy is about more than reading and writing-it is about how we communicate in society. It is about social practices and relationships, about knowledge, language and culture. Literacy finds its place in our lives alongside other ways of communicating. Indeed, literacy itself takes many forms: on paper, on the computer screen, on TV, on posters and signs. Those who use literacy take it for granted-but those who cannot use it are excluded from much communication in today's world. Indeed, it is the excluded who can best appreciate the notion of "literacy as freedom".

Why is critical literacy important?

We live in a rapidly changing, high tech global village. Children are inundated with the marketing of ideas and products in the media and on the internet. They need to be able to critically analyze these messages and make meaning from all that they read, hear and see.

<u>How can you support your child in becoming critically literate?</u>

- Engage in conversations with your child when watching television
- Listen to popular music and discuss the lyrics
- Watch music videos and talk about the images that are portrayed

- Look through newspapers, magazines and catalogues and discuss the images that are represented and those that are not
- Discuss advertisements in the media and ask "problem-posing questions"
- Visit historical sites, read markers, monuments and plaques and discuss the perspectives—which perspectives/facts are missing from these historical sites
- When your child raises an issue with you, analyze it together from different perspectives: raise questions about fairness and equity
- When reading with your child, discuss how the author uses language and images to influence the reader
- Take your child to diverse communities to experience different cultures and talk about what you see, hear, smell, taste and touch

What are some problem-posing question for discussion?

What point of view is presented by the author/characters/photographer/illustrator? How might the story/advertisement change if another gender was inserted? Are people with particular body types, clothes, skin colour represented? What gender is represented in the text? What gender is missing? What gender is marginalized? Who is doing all the talking? How is the family portrayed? Are these families realistic? What ethnic group or race is most common? What images are not apparent?

Are any people with disabilities represented?

PLANNING TODAY TO ENERGIZE EDUCATION TOMORROW

During the 2009/10 school year, the DSBN engaged in a system-wide review of our school buildings which enabled trustees to gain an overview of how our facilities are being used, and to identify potential areas for growth and revitalization in the future.

The majority of school boards throughout Ontario are facing the challenge of declining enrolment because of changing demographics. Parents are having fewer children later in life, which reduces the number of students starting Kindergarten each year.

One way school boards can address the issues of declining enrolment and aging facilities is through accommodation reviews. Through this process, education can be rejuvenated by building some new schools, consolidating some schools, renovating some schools and closing some schools.

At their most recent meeting, Trustees passed a Facilities Planning report which examines how to provide optimal learning spaces for students by initiating three phases of accommodation reviews beginning in September, 2011. Phase one accommodation reviews will undertake an indepth study of central and south St. Catharines and Thorold secondary schools as well as elementary schools in Fort Erie.

Over the coming months, Board staff will begin to assemble an Accommodation Review Committee (ARC) for the two reviews. Each committee will undertake an in-depth study of the school planning areas and provide recommendations that will help guide Trustees in their decision making. Each ARC will include a business community member and/or a municipal representative, parents, a trustee, and DSBN staff. All ARC meetings will be open to the public, and the public will also have an opportunity to provide feedback during specially scheduled public meetings.

Moving forward, our goal is to continue serving students with excellent programs. The accommodation review process will ensure that funding is spent on enriching the educational opportunities for students.
